Ealing Festival is a competitive event that takes place during April and May of each year. A registered charity, Ealing Festival is affiliated to the British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech, of which HM Queen Elizabeth II was Patron until her death. It is one of almost 250 affiliated festivals in the UK.

The Festival encourages the study and performance of the arts by giving competitors an opportunity to perform prepared pieces in public while receiving constructive criticism in a competitive but friendly atmosphere.

The sections currently represented are Dance, Instrumental and Pianoforte. Two sections, Speech, Drama & Verse and Vocal, are in abeyance owing to lack of personnel.

The Festival has classes for all ages and abilities and entries are welcome from all sources including teachers, schools, societies and individuals.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

Entries

- 1 Entry forms are on our website www.ealingfestival.org.uk and may be emailed. Late entries will be accepted only at the discretion of the Section Leader.
- 2 Dance and Piano teachers should use the multiple entry form. **Instrumental entrants are now required to enter as individuals.** All teachers are required to ensure that pupils and parents are aware of Festival regulations and Child Protection Policy.
- 3 No competitor may enter more than one solo class where an age limit is specified in the same sub-section, except in the Dance section, where competitors may also enter a novice class or a class in a higher age group than their own.
- 4 No entry fee can be returned unless a class is cancelled.
- 5 The Executive Committee reserves the right to refuse entry.
- 6 All competitors must enter under their own name. Anyone entering under an assumed name will be disqualified.

Eligibility

- 7 Except where otherwise indicated (i.e. that a class is open), only amateurs may enter the competitions, but choirs and orchestras may have professional conductors. A professional is defined as one who derives the major part of his/her income from performing or teaching in the branch of art concerned. Students who hold professional degrees or diplomas must disclose details in the entry form and may not compete in any class, other than an open class, in the subject covered by the qualifications.
- 8 An entrant may compete in more than one group or ensemble in the same class provided that the work performed is different on each occasion.
- 9 No entrant may perform a particular work in more than one class (except Dance, where the same piece may be performed in the Novice section, and Vocal, in the Challenge Cup class).

Ages

- 1 For Dance, age is reckoned from 31 August preceding the Festival. Otherwise, for all classes other than School Classes, the age is reckoned from 31 January preceding the Festival.
- 2 In school classes, the age is reckoned at 1 September preceding the Festival.

Order of appearance

The order of appearance is determined by lot but the organisers reserve the right to alter the order shown in the official programme. Competitors not present by the end of the class may be seen/heard if time permits, but will not be eligible for any award.

Timetable

Timetables are set by the Leader of the relevant section. No refunds will be given to competitors unable to attend at the set time.

Adjudicators

- 1 The adjudicator's decision is final. Adjudicators may stop any performance after their judgement has been formed. Competitors will receive an adjudicator's mark sheet at the conclusion of their class.
- 2 No one who has been a pupil of the adjudicator within the six months preceding the Festival may compete in any class judged by the adjudicator.
- 3 Competitors, teachers and other interested parties may not communicate with the adjudicator prior to or during the competition. Any infringement of this rule may render the competitor liable to disgualification.

Accompanists

There is no official accompanist. Competitors must provide their own as necessary.

Test pieces/adjudicator's copies

Set solos: any reasonable edition of the piece is acceptable. In the Instrumental and Pianoforte sections, where pieces are 'own choice', the title, composer or author and approximate timing **must** be stated on the entry form. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any considered unsuitable. **NB Copies of 'own choice' items must be provided for the adjudicator.**

Prizes and trophies

- 1 No prize, trophy or gold medal will be awarded in any class in which the maximum mark awarded is below 85% (see marking/category system opposite), except in the Baby classes in the Dance section.
- 2 All cups and other trophies are the property of the Festival and those awarded at the last Festival must be returned to the person nominated by the date specified under each individual section. **NB Cup and trophy holders who fail to return them will be obliged to reimburse the Festival for the full cost of replacement.**
- 3 Winners of cups and other trophies (or, if under 18, their parent or teacher) must provide their name and home address to the steward on duty at the session. Should any subsequent change take place, the section leader must be advised immediately.
- 4 The Festival does not have trophies inscribed with winners' names, but permission is given for this work to be done professionally, at the expense of the winners, if desired.

Marking

The British and International Federation of Festivals now uses the following marking scheme:

Category	Mark	Descriptor
DEVELOPING	65–69	A performance demonstrating awareness of technical skills, requiring more consistency and artistry
PROGRESSING	70–74	A performance showing development of technique and/or communication and commitment
MERIT	75–79	A competent performance showing some artistic awareness and/or technical ability
COMMENDED	80–84	A convincing performance technically and artistically with increasing stylistic and communication skills
HONOURS	85–89	A excellent performance demonstrating fluent technical and artistic skills with emerging individuality
OUTSTANDING	90–94	An impressive performance technically and artistically, displaying spontaneity and clear individuality
EXCEPTIONAL	95+	A superlative performance, displaying exceptional artistic individuality

A mark of at least 85% must be achieved for the award of any medal or trophy.

Prizes

The Dance section will award cups at the end of the Festival. Further details are in the Dance programme.

The Rene Myrtle Premier Award Dancers aged 13 years and over will be invited to perform for this award by the Adjudicator on the basis of their stage work throughout the Festival (to include all styles). Dancers will be notified when they have been selected, but may dance only once. Style of dance to be decided by the Adjudicator and may not be substituted. A prize of £100 is given to the winner of this section.

The Arts Educational Award A place on the Arts Educational Musical Theatre Summer School one-week course will be awarded to the performer aged 15 years and over who most excels in this genre, as selected by the adjudicator.

The Stella Mason Memorial Award Dancers aged 12 and under will be invited to perform for this award by the Adjudicator on the basis of their stage work throughout the Festival (to include all styles). They will be notified when they have been selected, but may dance only once. Style of dance to be decided by the Adjudicator and may not be substituted. A prize of £50 is given to the winner of this section.

Dance Section regulations

- 1 Classes are for amateurs and students who do not derive the major part of their income from the teaching or performance of dance.
- 2 Competitors attending full-time vocational dance training are not eligible to enter.
- 3 No entry can be accepted without payment. Entry procedure is changing. Please see website for further details.
- 4 Age to be taken as at 31 August 2024.
- 5 Time limits for each class must be strictly observed. The Adjudicator has the right to stop performances which exceed the time limit.

- 6 No pointe work is allowed below 12 years of age.
- 7 Costumes are optional throughout.
- 8 A central music system is provided. Dancers should provide their own recorded CDs, clearly labelled. Only one dance to be recorded on each CD, with no further tracks following. A back-up recording, preferably in a different medium, is required in the event of technical problems. CDs are to be given to the steward at least **15 minutes** before commencement of the section.
- 9 The Festival accepts no liability for the infringement of copyright, recording or performing rights arising out of any competitor's accompaniment, choreography or performance. Teachers and choreographers using music created from commercial recordings are advised that they are responsible for seeking permission to re-record from the recording companies concerned.
- 10 Dances set by an examining board for use in its syllabus may not be used.
- 11 Dances may not be re-started except in Baby Classes D1, D2, D3, D4 and D5, or if the accompaniment breaks down, or at the Adjudicator's discretion.
- 12 In Duet, Trio/Quartet or Group classes, the eldest competitor's age determines which class the group enters.
- 13 In Duet, Trio or Quartet classes more than once entry is permitted provided the style of dance is different. (Modern and Lyrical are classed as different styles.)
- 14 In Group classes a maximum of three entries is permitted provided the style of dance is different. (Modern and Lyrical are classed as different styles.)
- 15 Photography, filming and recording of performances is strictly prohibited.
- 16 Choreography D48 and D49: dance may be a Solo (2 minutes), Duet or Trio (3 minutes) or Small Group (4 minutes). Costume is optional. Students may submit a brief resumé indicating the costumes and setting they would use in actual performance. This should be submitted on the first day of the Festival.
- 17 Late arrivals will be allowed to dance only if time permits and at the organiser's discretion, and will be marked but not placed. Note that classes may start up to 20 minutes early.
- 18 The stage and wings are out of bounds except to competitors about to perform and to authorised persons: e.g. one assistant from each school accompanying children under 7, and for older performers an assistant to help with wardrobe or props.
- 19 Classes may be amalgamated or split depending on the number of entries.

Concerto award

Each Instrumental and Piano adjudicator will nominate a winner of a Concerto Class to compete for the chance to perform with the Ealing Symphony Orchestra during its 2025–6 season. Nominees will play for a panel of adjudicators who will choose the winner. The outright winner will also receive the **Concerto Prize** of £200.

Prizes

Cups, prizes and medals are awarded only if a mark of 85% or above has been achieved.

Cups must be signed for and returned to the section leaders (through St Benedict's School) by 22 March 2026.

Concerto award

Each Piano and Instrumental adjudicator will nominate a winner of a Concerto Class to compete for the chance to perform with the Ealing Symphony Orchestra during its 2025–6 season. Nominees will play for a panel of adjudicators who will choose the winner. The outright winner will also be awarded the **Concerto Prize** of £200.

Prizes

Cups, prizes and medals are awarded only if a mark of 85% or above has been achieved. The following awards may also be presented:

- 1 **Outstanding Merit Trophy**: for best performance aged 12 years and under
- 2 **Woodward Trophy**: for best performance in 13–15 age group
- 3 **Teo Trophy**: for best performance in the Haydn/Mozart class, P462.

Piano Section regulations

- 1 Entries must be made on the official entry forms and submitted with the appropriate fee. No entry will be accepted without full payment of fees.
- 2 Competitors are required to provide copies of 'own choice' pieces for the Adjudicator (photocopies are allowed for this purpose only and are destroyed after the day's sessions).
- 3 Competitors must observe stated time limits.
- 4 In Concerto, Exhibition and Bach sections competitors may enter only one class in each section.
- 5 No entrant may perform the same piece in more than one class.
- 6 Unless otherwise stated (as, for example, in Exhibition classes) **only one piece** may be played in each class.
- 7 In the event of any class being over-subscribed, it may at the Section Leader's discretion be split into two and the two classes run consecutively.

EALING FESTIVAL OF MUSIC, DANCE, SPEECH AND DRAMA CHILD PROTECTION POLICY

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech works for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation and its member festivals are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is never acceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, adjudicator members, volunteers, students and anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm.

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member festivals in time for the start of the festival year.

Creating safer festivals for everyone

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to create **safer festivals** for **everyone**:

- 1 A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2 One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival. Name: Mrs Yvonne Baisden Tel: 07985 438203
- 3 Best practice advice in the form of **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection leaflets**, with support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers, including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4 Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new festival staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending/performing at a Federation festival.
- 5 All Festival personnel wear an official Ealing Festival badge and may be approached with any problem. They will direct you to the Section Leader when required. All teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection** best practice advice. In addition we will ensure the availability of a quiet area/room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6 For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, practice and changing rooms that may be provided. The Festival cannot take responsibility for any property left unattended.
- 7 All changing rooms are clearly marked for male/female festival use. Male relatives are not permitted in the female changing rooms. If a father wishes to assist in his daughter's preparation, the Section Leader must be told in advance so that arrangements can be made.
- 8 No unauthorised photography, audio or video recording of children and young people is allowed in the performance areas at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in official photos.
- 9 Some children and vulnerable adults may have specific needs in order to take part. If this is the case we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Section Leader (see syllabus or Festival website) prior to arrival. The Festival actively seeks wherever possible to meet these needs, but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 10 The Festival's Child Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our syllabus, programme and on our website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents/guardians/carers and teachers of competitors under 18 (or vulnerable adults of any age) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the competitors to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.
- 11 Covid Policy: this will reflect current government guidelines and is available on the website.
